Lubber Run Community Center
Former site of the grand "Henderson House" circa 1894, later to become the first permanent recreation center in the County.

Charles E. Mix House
205 N. Galveston St. Built between 1820-1840 by Charles E. Mix, Commissioner of U.S. Indian Affairs

Lubber Run Park
The first public park in Arlington County, it's popular for hiking, biking, dog-walking, and bird-watching

Lubber Run Amphitheatre
Built in 1969, it hosts dozens of performances each summer, part of Arlington's "Arts al Fresco" program

Arlington Forest Shopping Center

The Holly Tree
was moved here during the construction of Arlington Forest in 1941

Mary Carlin House
5512 N. Carlin Springs Rd. Probably the second oldest structure in Arlington, built around 1800 by William Carlin

Carlin Springs
A historical marker here describes the resort area that was popular in the late 1800's

W&OD Shared Use Trail
follows the former railroad right-of-way from Shirlington to Purcellville, Virginia
