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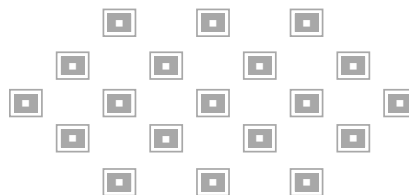
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AFCA May 2026 Meeting

26 Lubber Run Amphitheater Music Series a Smash!

Despite rain, heat, and smoke resulting in disappointing cancellations, the Lubber Run Amphitheater again delivered many memorable performances on June, July, and August Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings.

The season kicked off on June 6 with "The Voice" contestant and DMV blues diva Carly Harvey, who performed several stunning songs by the late Amy Winehouse, including "Back to Black." The Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation also hosted free ice cream treats on opening night, to the delight of attendees. The Rumba Club's driving beat brought dozens out to dance in the amphitheater "mosh pit." The Arlington Philharmonic, led by musical director and conductor A. Scott Wood, included a stirring rendition of "Hymn to the Fallen" from the movie "Saving Private Ryan." The Grandsons celebrated their 40th anniversary at the amphitheater with amazing rock, reggae, and folk tunes. A Simon and Garfunkel Tribute, brought to us by Newmyer Flyer Productions, performed classic songs from the 1960s-70s. The ever-popular King Soul rendered several rollicking rhythm and blues classics. The 19th Street Band played several amazing numbers, including the Beatles classic "Two of Us." Arlington's own Valeria Stewart graced the audience with Argentinian and roots rock songs from her

newest album. Capitol Blend and Vox Pop harmonized with stunning a capella numbers. Poet and singer Rose Moraes brought to the stage her soul of Brazilian music. The season concluded with a Saturday performance by the Pirog Brothers and Friends with some hard-driving 1950s rock numbers, including Buddy Holly's classic "Peggy Sue," and a wonderful Sunday performance by STEMusic, with songs and lessons about STEM (science, technology, engineering, math).

Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation volunteers were at each performance welcoming and assisting attendees, supporting county staff, and providing guitar fans to help attendees cool down on warm evenings. They answered questions and provided updates on all performances on social media, including Facebook and Instagram, where you can now see video clips of many of this past summer's performances. The Racial Covenant on Your Property and How to Remove It

Did you know that most properties in Arlington Forest were originally deeded with a covenant, now unenforceable, that restricts occupancy and use to persons of the “Caucasian Race”? These covenants were established as part of the transfer of the land to Meadowbrook, Inc., the original developer, and were intended to bind all future homeowners. Restrictive racial covenants are now unenforceable under federal and state law but linger on as records of past discrimination. The Arlington Forest Citizens Association website (arlingtonforestva.org) has more information about these covenants.

A research team from local universities (Mary Washington and Marymount) has documented large numbers of restrictive covenants in northern Virginia. The team constructed an online map that allows you to find a property and identify the covenant language that applies. (See the mapping utility at documentingexclusion.org.)

Even though the restrictive covenant on my property was void as a matter of law, I was still uncomfortable knowing it was there. Fortunately, Virginia has instituted a fairly simple way for homeowners to remove prohibited covenants. Homeowners can fill out a “Certificate of Release of Certain Prohibited Covenants,” available on the website of the Arlington Land Records Division. There’s a \$31 filing fee, and you need a notarized signature. You also need information from the original “Deed of Dedication” for the section of Arlington Forest that includes your property. There were nine original sections,

which are shown on maps on the AFCA website. You can find the deeds and the information you need by using the public computer kiosks in the Arlington Land Office located in the Arlington Courthouse or by subscribing to the Land Records online search system. After I mailed in the form, it took only a week or so for the release to be recorded. I am happy to provide more details on how I completed the form to anyone interested (stephmartin60@aol.com).

Our Local Nature Center

The Long Branch Nature Center, just minutes away off S. Carlyn Springs Rd., hosts year-round county-run programs and special events, including story times, hikes, nature walks, and campfires. The nature center features a native plant garden along with seasonal exhibits, a children’s Discovery Room, live animals, a viewing pond, space for birthday parties, and an outdoor Nature Discovery Area.

Long Branch stream flows through the woods, past two ponds with seasonal frogs and turtles. Long Branch’s wooded stream valley is home to raccoons, foxes, flying squirrels, salamanders, and more. You can also see a variety of butterflies and other insects. Trails at Long Branch connect to Glencarlyn Park and the W&OD Trail, including a 6-foot waterfall called Huffman’s Falls, a great sit spot in a natural setting.

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Arlington Public Schools: From One-Room Schoolhouse to Modern School System

School just started, so we thought it would be timely to look at the history of public education in our community. Although Arlington now has over 40 public schools, the idea of a free public school system barely existed 150 years ago. Wealthy families hired tutors or governesses. Children might attend a small private school, sometimes operated out of a teacher's home, called a "dame school." Other children were simply taught at home by family members—"homeschooled," but not as part of an organized educational movement like today. No comprehensive system of free public education existed.

In 1870, Virginia established a statewide system of free public schools. At the time, Arlington was called Alexandria County, a largely rural area west of the city of Alexandria. The earliest county schools included the Columbia School, located along what is now Columbia Pike near Walter Reed Dr.; the Walker School at Ball's Crossroads, today the heart of Ballston at the intersection of Glebe Rd. and Wilson Blvd.; the Hume School, which now houses the Arlington Historical Museum on S. Arlington Ridge Rd.; and a school for Black children in Freedman's Village on the grounds of what is now Arlington National Cemetery.

The Columbia School is generally considered the first public school in Arlington. Opened in 1870 or 1871, the school was initially housed in a building that had been operated privately before opening for public education. One of the best surviving reminders of this early era is the Queen Anne-style Hume School (see photo), built in 1891. With three school rooms, it was considered quite large for its day. It served local children for 67 years before closing in 1958. By 1900, Alexandria County had 11 public schools—six for White and five for Black students. That might seem small, but the county was only beginning its transformation from rural Virginia crossroads to Washington suburb.

At the time, public education in Arlington largely meant school through the eighth grade. Early childhood education (kindergarten and pre-kindergarten) was unknown, and students who wanted to continue their education beyond the eighth grade had limited options. High-school-level instruction began in Arlington in 1917, when about 30 students and two teachers began classes at the Mount Vernon School. In 1919, George Mason High School opened with 39 students and four teachers.

By then, Arlington was changing. Streetcars and improved transportation made it easier for Washington residents to live outside the city. Farms and country estates were gradually giving way to subdivisions and neighborhoods, and with a growing population came a growing demand for schools. The little schoolhouses of rural Arlington increasingly gave way to larger buildings designed to serve a growing suburban population. By the 1920s-30s, Arlington's schools were beginning to look more like the system we recognize today. Neighborhood schools became an important part of community life. Children attended school with others who lived nearby. Schools became not only places for reading, writing, and arithmetic, but also gathering places for communities.

Yet Arlington's educational system remained divided by race. Black and White children attended separate schools, and the opportunities and resources available to them were far from equal. That division would become one of the defining stories in Arlington's educational history—and ultimately one in which Arlington played an important role in the history of school desegregation in Virginia. In next month's edition, we will tell that story.

Forester Photo Exhibit Featuring Local Wildlife

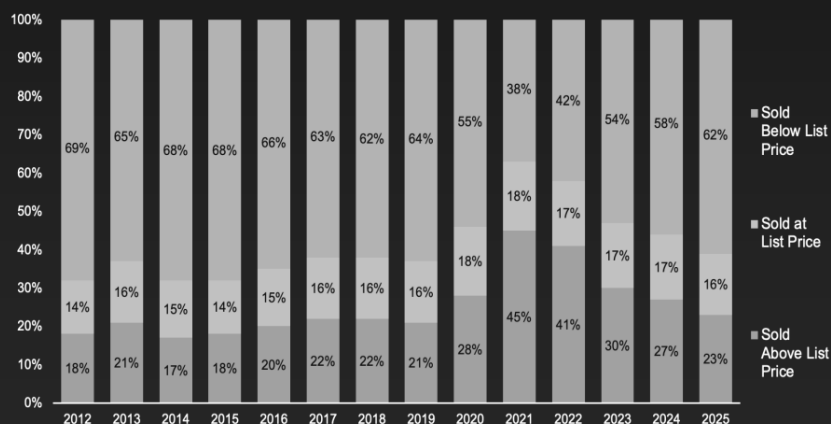


Have you seen the beautiful nature photography on display at the Lubber Run Community Center? Arlington County is home to a surprising variety of wildlife—our residential neighborhoods and natural parklands are home to hundreds of native species. David Howell's photo exhibit of local wildlife is now on display in the

Lubber Run Community Center until October. It includes 45 photos of birds, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and insects, all taken in nearby parks ranging from the LRCC itself to the Long Branch Nature Center, Bluemont Park, and Sparrow Pond on the W&OD Trail. Stop by and take a look at this delightful exhibit!

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Arlington's Stumbling Stones Program

Stumbling Stones are plaques in the sidewalk that memorialize enslaved people near where they lived and worked in Arlington. The idea is based on Germany's *Stolpersteine* ("stumbling stones"), which memorialize victims of the Holocaust, giving passersby pause to reflect. From at least the 1750s until the Civil War, enslaved people worked on farms across what was then called Alexandria County. The purpose of Stumbling Stones in Arlington is to memorialize enslaved people for whom we have identifiable information—currently more than 2,700 people, with more than 1,200 names identified. What is now Arlington Forest had up to 10 farms owned and operated by enslavers. In spring 2026, two Stumbling Stones memorializing an enslaved woman and man were installed outside the Lubber Run Community Center.

AFCA is considering sponsoring Stumbling Stones at the entrance to the Lubber Run Amphitheater, one of the most visited places in Arlington Forest. The cost for each marker (including installation) is \$300, with Memorializing the Enslaved in Arlington coordinating approval and installation by Arlington County. Once the neighborhood has made a decision and approval has been obtained, MEA orders the stone and works with AFCA to coordinate a date when the stones are dedicated. The dedication ceremony typically takes about an hour. MEA invites an elected official to speak and brings at least one person to tell the story of the people being memorialized.



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How to Control Mosquitoes Without Killing Pollinators

Hot weather will linger into fall, bringing the annual scourge of mosquitoes to Arlington neighborhoods. Besides protecting ourselves with fans and mosquito spray, we need to eliminate mosquito habitat and control mosquito numbers. Unfortunately, the pesticides used to kill mosquitoes also kill other invertebrates, including pollinators and insects that feed birds and eat mosquitoes themselves. Mosquito-spraying companies typically use pesticides with chemicals called pyrethroids, many of which are highly toxic to honeybees, fish, and small aquatic organisms.

Because mosquitoes easily fly from yard to yard, the best way to combat them is to work with neighbors to reduce mosquito populations without using pesticides. Here are some tips:

Eliminate potential mosquito-breeding grounds. Mosquitoes can breed in any water that stagnates for just 2 or 3 days, so you can reduce populations by:

- unclogging gutters;
- covering, turning over, or moving indoors any equipment, containers, or toys that might collect water;
- straightening sagging tarps or other covers;
- filling in areas under outdoor faucets or air conditioning drains;
- repairing damaged screens on rain barrels; and
- removing English ivy (which pools water where mosquitoes breed and provides the humidity that mosquitoes like).

Keep mosquitoes from breeding in uncovered pools like ponds and bird baths. You can reduce mosquitoes by:

- changing the water every few days;
- using mosquito dunks (deadly to mosquito, black fly, and fungus gnat larvae but harmless to other organisms); and
- keeping the water moving (for example, with a fountain).

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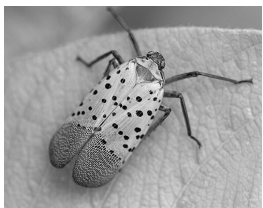


Mountain Kim Martial Arts has moved into the empty space once occupied by an equipment rental business. The grand opening on August 15 featured a ribbon cutting ceremony and martial arts demonstrations by instructors and students, watched by many Foresters. The school offers classes in both taekwondo and judo—you can stop by for more information.

Ever Consider Planting a Drought-Tolerant Tree?

For much of this and last year, our area was in “moderate” to “severe” drought, according to the online U.S. Drought Monitor. An official Drought Watch persisted when conditions improved in August to “abnormally dry.” In July, Casey Trees circulated information about native trees that do well in droughty urban conditions, including bur oak, hackberry, eastern redcedar, honey locust, and northern catalpa.

Spotted Lanternfly



Foresters have noticed rising numbers of this nonnative pest. Introduced from Asia and arriving in Virginia in 2018, SLF prefers the sap of ailanthus (tree of heaven), an invasive Asian tree, but it also feeds on other plants, potentially weakening valued trees. Arlington County is removing ailanthus from public lands, and officials expect SLF numbers to peak in 2028-29 before leveling off. Predators include native birds and insects, and scientists are studying the feasibility of introducing Asian wasps that specialize in feeding on SLF. County Project to Repair Sparrow Pond

Arlington County completed Sparrow Pond renovation in fall 2024, and plants and animals are flourishing there again. However, ongoing problems with stormwater runoff in Arlington Forest Branch have already affected the upper part of the pond. Last spring, the county launched a 3- to 6-month project to raise the maintenance area adjacent to the pond and add riprap to prevent erosion on the slope near the old outflow.

Wood Ducks at Sparrow Pond



Last year, wood ducks raised a family of six ducklings in Sparrow Pond. This year, the ducks were back: in early June, birders spotted two mother wood ducks with eleven ducklings each. Wood ducks nest in hollow trees (hence the name), mimicked by wood duck boxes posted in Sparrow Pond. By summer, the number of ducklings had fallen due to predation by hawks, foxes, or other animals.

Ongoing High Marks for Parks

In 2026, Arlington’s parks again ranked seventh among the nation’s 100 largest urban areas in the Trust for Public Lands (TPL) ParkScore index, marking 11 consecutive years in the top 10. The rankings are based on five factors: Arlington again lost points for acreage and equity (distribution of parks by race and income) but got top marks for access, investment, and amenities (such as playgrounds). The honor came on top of other achievements for Arlington’s Department of Parks and Recreation, including the 2025 National Gold Medal Award in Parks and Recreation Management and four top state awards.

Beavers Return to Sparrow Pond



In the early 1990s, beavers dammed Arlington Forest Branch, the brook between Southside and Barcroft, to create Sparrow Pond. Fearing flood damage to the W&OD Trail, Arlington County removed the beaver dam in 1996. In the early 2000s, the county worked with NOVA Parks to refurbish the pond to help control stormwater runoff. Returning beavers dammed the outlet in 2019, only to leave a few years later. The county then removed the beaver dam and renovated the pond in 2023-24—and beavers were back by last June. On an evening in August, visitors to the pond saw two beavers swimming and feeding on leaves.

Hawks Nest in Glencarlyn Park



Last year, red-shouldered hawks nested near the pavilion in Lubber Run Park, but not this year. However, birders found a nest with chicks high in a red oak in Glencarlyn

Park near the parking lot for the Long Branch Nature Center. Red-shouldered hawks, common in our area, have a distinctive song, sounding like keer, keer, keer. The hawks might have preyed on ducklings in Sparrow Pond last spring.

Is Your Teen Looking for a Job?

This newsletter is delivered eight times a year to 852 homes by an intrepid group of 12 teens from the neighborhood. The kids get a small stipend for each month's delivery—\$15 or more, depending on the number of copies and inserts. There was a lot of turnover within the group last year due to high school graduations and the like, and our waiting list for new deliverers is now exhausted. Sunfish Return to Lubber Run

In 2011, when Arlington County last assessed fish in Arlington streams, monitors found only blacknose dace and mummichogs in Lubber Run (plus a few eels). Both are tiny species that tolerate low-quality stream habitats. In a sign of improving stream quality, you can now see sunfish in Lubber Run. Standing on the upper bridge last summer over a relatively deep pool, visitors to the park watched sunfish tend their stream bottom nests.



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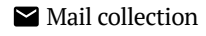
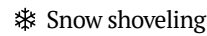
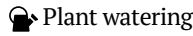
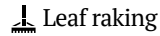
