Major Progress on Amphitheatre

Last month, the County Board allocated money in the FY2012 Arlington budget that promises renewed life for the Lubber Run Amphitheatre. The budget includes up to \$45,000 to support programming at Lubber Run and other county performance venues and allocates \$100,000 for "study and capital needs toward restoration of the Lubber Run Amphitheatre."

The budget was announced shortly after a week of meetings with Lubber Run Amphitheatre Foundation members and County Board members culminating in an April 11 public meeting with County Manager Barbara Donellan hosted by the Foundation at Barrett Elementary School.

Donellan, along with top Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs officials, discussed the challenges faced in bringing

the amphitheatre up to current safety and access standards. They noted particular concern with meeting requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act and possible flood plain restrictions.

More than 60 people filled the Barrett library at the public meeting. Foundation president Esther Bowring chaired the meeting and told Donellan that meetings with County Board members at the amphitheatre the previous week had focused on errors and misrepresentations in an engineering assessment of the facility commissioned by the county last year. Bowring said that the Foundation and its supporters throughout the county wanted more information about the facility's condition and more opportunity for public input and participation into decisions about the amphitheatre's future.

Donellan acknowledged that she had heard from the County Board and their direction to her was to solve the safety and access problems at the amphitheatre so that it can support programs this summer and work with the Foundation and other public groups to get it done.

Bowring and Donellan agreed to establish two task force groups of citizens and county employees to work on safety and access plans and programming for the amphitheatre. A number of Arlington Foresters and others attending the meeting signed up for the task forces at the end of the meeting. Donellan said she would schedule meetings of the groups within the next few weeks. In the meantime, she directed her staff to form internal groups to begin laying out options for facility maintenance and summer programming.

Donellan will attend a second public meeting to discuss the Lubber Run Amphitheatre at 6:30 PM on May 16 at the Lubber Run Recreation Center, George Mason and North Park Drives. All Arlington Foresters are invited.

Successful Neighborhood Cleanup

Around 125 Arlington Forest residents came out in the fresh spring air on Saturday, April 30, to participate in the first annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup. They tackled six cleanup sites around our neighborhood: Lubber Run Park (35 volunteers),

the trail below the N. Edison playground (21 volunteers), the buffer strip on the southside of Route 50 (25 volunteers), Four Mile Run at the foot of N. Granada (30 volunteers), Four Mile Run at the foot of S. Park (10 volunteers) and the N. Henderson traffic circle (4 volunteers).

In a good sign for our nation's future, over half of the helping hands were kids: Barrett Daisy Troop 6100, Brownie Troop 396, Cub Scout Pack 648, Boy Scout Troop 648, along with many children who came out with their families. The volunteers gathered up mounds of trash, debris and invasive plants which the County later hauled away. Accompanying this article are several photos of the cleanup.

After the event, I received the following congratulatory note from Mr. Lyndell Core, parks maintenance supervisor for the Arlington County Department of Parks, Recreation & Cultural Resources:



The strawberries are coming! By Ryoko Reed


Three years ago, about this time in the spring, the national news was filled with an outbreak of salmonella in packaged salsa. The horror! My favorite fat-free condiment and I could not eat it for fear I would lose 10 pounds the unpleasant way. At first, the CDC suspected tomatoes, then peppers, and eventually, I forget what they found. But no matter. I took matters into my own hands and started an organic garden...in our front yard. Since then, we have added two more garden beds in our front yard, because it gets the best morning sun in our lot. Our front yard vegetable garden beds have been a great way to get fresh local food, but we've connected to our Arlington Forest neighbors like never before—from our friends in the neighborhood to people driving by stopping in front of our street. I've given away pounds of potatoes, tomatoes, Asian cucumbers, chard and lettuce to name a few to share in our bounty. I've had our daughter Kimi and her neighborhood friends help me plant seeds, pick vegetables and help weed our garden.

For those of you walking by our garden in the first block of N. Granada St. on your way to the WO&D trail, to the bus stop, or other activities, let me walk you through our garden in springtime. We follow a bio-intensive gardening method, and use techniques studied and promoted at Ecology Action, a non-profit organization in California. (Disclaimer: My brother-in-law studied there and is now an organic farmer in Mendocino County in California.)

First, gardening is all about the soil. We mix together our homemade compost, topsoil, sand, and peat moss. Second, we use a method called "double digging." You'll see my husband James through rain, hail and wind double digging in our garden during spring. That is a method where you dig more than 24 inches below and mix up the soil. This produces great aeration in our garden bed. Finally, we use a planting method called "companion planting". This is where, instead of traditional farming where you have rows and rows of one crop, you mix in other "companion" plants, such as marigold (which repels some insects), mint (which repels other insects like aphids), and strawberries (which attracts good insects like bees). Instead of rows, we plant these companion plants in hexagon patterns across our garden bed.



can attract bees for the strawberry plants. In our second garden bed, we started four different kinds of tomatoes red, pink, orange and yellow—with cucumbers, nasturtiums, sweet peas and kale. In our third garden bed, we have collard greens, more tomatoes, basil, soybeans, bush beans and carrots. On the side, we have three grow-bags of potatoes.

I'm excited about the planting season, and look forward to writing about the harvest season in August—stay tuned or stop on by!



Around the Forest

Gunfire along Lubber Run: 150 years ago, Union and Confederate troops may have skirmished in what is now Lubber Run Park according to a long-time resident who says that Civil War-era mini-balls were found in trees there during tree trimming in the 1950s. It is certain that the Mary Carlin House (ca. 1800) and the Charles E. Mix House (ca. 1820-40) – both in the Greenbrier Section -- were around during the war. As our nation commemorates the Civil War's sesquicentennial, the editor of this newsletter would like to hear from anyone who knows of historical documents that detail Civil War events in Arlington Forest. One possibility for a local commemoration would be a walking tour of those sites.

Yard Sale: The May 21 Community Yard Sale map on the back cover of this newsletter depicts those participants who signed-up by this issue's copy deadline. AFCA will place classified ads in local newspapers the week before the sale. Sale participants living near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs pointing into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove signs at day's end). Four Mile Run Trail: The County plans to rehabilitate the 27-inch sanitary sewer pipe that runs along the Four Mile Run bike trail from Route 50 to Columbia pike from mid-May to late June. Nearby residents may notice noise from bypass pumps and a boiler truck which will be onsite. Some of the work may take place at night. The pumps and boilers will run up to 24 hours at a time while the new sewer liner cures. The contractor will run hoses across the bike/pedestrian path for bypass purpose, Signs, ramps, lighting, and cones will be placed to alert trail users.

Michael Kerley Honored: Forester Mike Kerley received the Arlington County Civic Federation's top award at its annual dinner and awards program last month. Mike was honored for his accomplishments during his two years as president of the Federation which represents 81 neighborhood associations and countywide groups including AFCA. Mike has also been an AFCA representative to the Federation for a number of years.

Boy Scout News: Boy scouts from Troop 648 (Arlington Forest United Methodist Church) will head off for a week of scout camp in late June. However, before that in mid-May and then later in the summer, look for the scouts in Lubber Run Park, as they carry out two scheduled Eagle Scout service projects to plant trees, clear out invasives and restore park trails.

Student Honored: Northside resident Dawson Cannon was on the Washington-Lee High School team that placed as first runner up in the national 2011 Construction Industry Roundtable (CIRT)-ACE Mentor Design Competition. The competition promotes innovation in the design and construction community to improve the quality of life, while also understanding challenges unique to the industry.

Cub Scout News: Cub Scout Pack 648 celebrated another successful year with their Blue and Gold Dinner at Our Savior Lutheran Church on April 8th. The Pack also celebrated ten scouts who earned the Arrow of Light badge, the highest award in Cub Scouting: Andrew Hawkins, Carl Barrett, Henry Pulley, Louis Chavez, Jack Peterson, Harrison Gardner, Ruben Stann, Garrett Johnston, Cliff Hawrey, and Luke Hoffman. Most of these scouts will continue their scouting adventures with Boy Scout Troop 648. Boys can start Cub Scouts when they are 7 years old or start the 1st grade.

"Green" Homes: If you missed the April presentation at the Arlington Central Library on "High-Performance Home Renovations" by Marta Layseca of EnviroHomeDesign, you can see it online at http://envirohomedesign.com/presentation.html. The lecture explains how old homes can be updated into high-performance homes that are beautiful, functional and healthy while minimizing materials during construction and conserving water and energy during the building's life. One of the homes cited in the talk is in Arlington Forest.

Block Parties: A great way to get to know neighbors is to organize a block party. For example, the first block of N. Granada has a party each September which the majority of neighbors typically attend, bringing their own chairs and pot luck appetizers, entrées and desserts. The kids have a blast playing in the closed-off street. To hold a block party, a permit to temporarily close the street to non-resident traffic must be obtained from the County. It costs \$64 (including the delivery and pick up of six orange cones to detour traffic) and must be picked in person. See the County website for details.



Nature News

Plant a Tree: The Arlington County Tree Canopy Fund (TCF) provides grants to community groups to plant trees on private property to increase Arlington's tree cover. TCF provides funds for planting trees with diameters of about two inches that, at maturity, will be large canopy trees. AFCA will file an application for those interested in getting a tree. Alert Forester Protects Watershed: When Greenbrier Section resident and past AFCA President David Mog noticed heavy silt entering Lubber Run from a storm water pipe at the top of the park near N. George Mason in mid-March, he traced the runoff back to the Buckingham construction site. He notified the County's Department of Environmental Services which sent out an inspector who directed the contractor to install the legally-required filter bag between its pump hoses and the storm sewer. That stopped the harmful silt from entering the Chesapeake watershed. Neighbors who notice apparent cases of illegal runoff should call County storm water specialist Diana Handy at 703-228-0772.

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Sharing the Forest: A brown fox has been seen making the rounds of the first blocks of N. Granada and N. Galveston after sunrise in recent weeks. According to website of the Humane Society of the United States, "Foxes aren't dangerous to humans, except when they are rabid (which is very rare) or are captured and handled." The website of the Animal Welfare League of Arlington says "There's no need to fear wildlife. If you don't bother them, they generally won't bother you."



Northern Virginia Market Trends

The Northern Virginia Association of

Realtors® reports on March 2011 home sales activity for Fairfax and Arlington counties, the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax and Falls Church and the towns of Vienna, Herndon and Clifton. A total of 1,437 homes sold in March 2011, a 7.71% decrease below March 2010 home sales of 1,557. Active listings decreased by 7% from 2010, with 3,975 active listings in 3/11, compared with 4,267 homes available in 3/10. The average days on market (DOM) for homes in 3/11 increased 39% to 71 days, compared with 51 days in 3/10. Sale prices rose compared with those realized last year. The average sales price in March 2011 increased 3% from March 2010, to \$448,957 from \$434,129 last March. The median price of homes sold rose in March 2011 to \$385,000, an increase of about 5% compared with March 2010's median price of \$368,000.

The number of new pending home sales in Northern Virginia in March showed a decrease of 5.5% 2,113 compared to 2,236 new contracts pending in March 2010.

Arlington County Statistics comparing March 2010 to 2011: Condos - Avg. Sold Price was \$373,112 in 3/10 - up 13% in 3/11 to \$421,108. Single Family Attached - Avg. Sold Price was \$551,911 in 3/10 - up 18% to \$653,160 in 3/11. Single Family Detached - Avg. Sold Price was \$712,483 in 3/10 - up 3% to \$732,041 in 3/11.

Mortgage Rates are still attractive! The following rates are average quotes with no points: 4.75% to \$417,000, 4.88% up to \$729,750, 5.38% over \$729,750

On 10/1/11 the current administration is *proposing* lowering the conforming loan amount from \$729,750 to \$625,500 for FHA, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac housing loans.



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
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
