## Editor's Note

The Arlington Forester welcomes articles, news notes, letters, and photos focusing on non-commercial events or issues specific to our neighborhood. We publish eight times per year (Sept to Nov and Jan to May). Deadline for submissions is the first of the month. E-mail submissions of up to 400 words to newsletter@arlingtonforestva.org. Space often fills up before the deadline.

#### Help Wanted: Newsletter Editor and Designer

We got no response to last month's call for volunteers to replace *Arlington Forester* editor John Naland and layout/design coordinator Laura Smialowicz who are stepping down after 10 years. John and Laura are available to produce the five remaining issues before publication pauses during the summer, but they want to start training their replacements in the coming months.

The editor collects articles, writes news briefs (often based on info from County listservs), and coordinates with advertisers. The current editor coordinates newsletter distribution, but another volunteer could be recruited to do that. The prerequisites are a computer, Internet connection, and written communication skills.

The layout and design volunteer places the articles and advertisements into the newsletter template in Adobe InDesign. He/she occasionally creates small graphics or basic advertisements. AFCA reimburses for the InDesign subscription. The prerequisites are a computer, Internet connection, and InDesign proficiency.

Because the newsletter is published on a fixed schedule, the editor and layout/design volunteer must be available on the eight weekends when final layout occurs. One person could do both jobs if they had both writing and InDesign skills.

The Arlington Forester plays a critical role in linking the three geographically separated sections of our community. Through the printed newsletter, all our 851 households learn about neighborhood issues and are drawn together for communitywide events. If the newsletter were replaced by emailed updates, most residents would be left in the dark since fewer than half are registered AFCA members. This reduced publicity would likely reduce attendance at AFCA meetings, the holiday party, amphitheater concerts, farmers market, park cleanups, and the annual yard sale.

### Lubber Run Recreation Center Update

If you have driven by the Lubber Run Recreation Center lately, you may have noticed the addition of huge beams above the building's central gym. The Center has really taken shape over the last couple months as crews work to get the building closed in before winter. At the end of October, the last giant truss was installed, marking the topping off of the building - when the last beam is placed atop a structure during its construction. As is customary on construction projects, the staff and crew held a party to mark the occasion that was attended by the County Manager.

To further commemorate the milestone, Department of Parks and Recreation Athletic and Facility Services Division Chief Peter Lusk and Department of Environmental Services Facilities Project Specialist Michael Manos invited AFCA officers on a tour on October 28<sup>th</sup> to view the progress (see photo). Although the walls were concrete and there were no finishes, we used a bit of imagination to picture the finished spaces: activity rooms with soaring ceilings, inspiring views of Lubber Run Park, and an exciting, multi-level playground.

The County will hold a tour for the entire community in the spring. To keep up to date search "Lubber Run Community Center Project" on the County website.

This time of year is when we enter a winter market stage, with fewer homes being listed for sale. Some homes priced inaccurately are staying on the market longer than they might have earlier in the year. The decrease in new inventory is noticeable to buyers who have been tracking the market this year. Some homes might take a bit longer to sell depending upon the price range, location and condition, although we are still seeing multiple offers in some situations as there is still good momentum in the local real estate market.

Historically, between November to January we see a smaller amount of properties hit the market and this year Arlington is experiencing historically low inventory levels which has caused frustration for many buyers.

Arlington's problem with low housing stock is also a national issue. The inventory level is the US has dropped 2.7% from last year's third quarter.

Pricing a home properly is the key factor a seller can control. There are typically four different pricing strategies that are used in our local market (contact me for more on how that works and the impact it has).

Condition is also critical dynamic. Since the typical buyer in Arlington is paying a premium price for housing, they are maxing out their purchasing power just to acquire the home, which leaves them with little resources for upgrades after closing. So they seek homes that are in pristine condition and will pay a higher price for a turnkey property.

#### Volunteers Needed for Neighborhood Conservation Plan Revision

Arlington Forest has a neighborhood conservation plan. It covers topics ranging from street conditions to our local parks, and it sets priorities for our neighborhood that County government can use in its project planning. Having a current plan helps us work with the County to improve our neighborhood -- such as signage to highlight historic and natural features and pro-active storm water improvements.

Our existing plan was drafted in 1991, almost 30 years ago. It is high time for a plan revision, and we need your help! Consider contributing 5, 10, or 20 hours between now and March to write one or more sections and bring our plan up to date. The sections do not have to be long, and you will have lots of guidance, along with survey data and other information to work with. This is not a hard lift, and you will get credit!

For your section, you would note any updates in County policies or plans; we will connect you to County staff if needed. Then you would draft a few paragraphs describing the current situation and any opportunities for improvement. Once neighborhood survey data is compiled, you would compose recommendations for County action. We may meet as a team, in person or by phone. We are looking for volunteers for the Land Use and Zoning subsections on: (1) existing land uses and County policy guidance for future land development; and (2) development potential, including for the Arlington Forest Shopping Center and neighborhood churches. The Housing section needs a simple overview of the type and ownership of neighborhood housing, the general condition of Arlington Forest homes, and housing trends.

In the section on Public Services and Facilities, we need volunteers to write about (1) County services such as trash collection and emergency response; (2) social services such as for children and seniors; and (3) private neighborhood services such as hospitals and utilities. One volunteer is welcome to take on one, two, or all three.

Finally, we need someone to write about the commercial areas in or near Arlington Forest, including the various types of businesses and relationships with residential areas.



The next few months are action packed! Please join us for the following events:


-- December: The always popular book fair will take place in early December. This is a great opportunity to build up your personal libraries as well as purchasing books from teacher wish lists.

### **Barrett School News**

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, Barrett 2<sup>nd</sup> graders hosted a digital living museum night by bringing historic Hispanic figures to life. The event not only honored those historic figures, but also educated the Barrett community of the important contribution of many Hispanic individuals.

In addition, Barrett PTA members attended a congressional Commonwealth Coffee event celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month with Senators Tim Kaine and Mark Warner where we presented the Senators with our new Barrett tshirts! (see photo) Over the past month, we have met with staff of the Virginia congressional delegation to explore opportunities to work together to support the Barrett community.

In our Discovery Lab classroom, students explored the Chesapeake Bay exhibit, which was on loan from the Virginia Living Museum. Connecting to the exhibit, students traced the path of water outdoors on watershed walks and in the Lab with Google Earth on iPads; created physical models of watersheds; and observed how pollution from many sources makes it way to the bay. Ms. Melody Mobley, our new volunteer from AAAS working in the Discovery Lab, also shared about her career as the first African-American female forester in the U.S. Forest Service.



As a NASA Explorer School, students watched live as two female astronauts made a historic spacewalk outside the International Space Station! A special treat for the 5<sup>th</sup> graders was a presentation by a former Barrett student who is currently working on a degree in aerospace engineering. In addition, Dr. Laurie Sullivan, who leads Barrett's Discovery Lab, was asked

by the U.S. Department of State to share some NASA Explorer School lessons with teachers in Kazakhstan (a highlight video of the presentation featuring Barrett students in the Discovery Lab can be viewed here: https://youtu.be/vKzjDqdvPIU).


