Help Wanted: Newsletter Editor and Designer

After a decade of producing this newsletter, John Naland (editor) and Laura Smialowicz (layout and design) are ready to step down.

The Arlington Forester plays a critical role in linking the three geographically separated sections of our community. Through the newsletter, residents learn about neighborhood issues and are drawn together for communitywide events. AFCA needs new volunteers to keep the newsletter going.

The editor collects articles (for example, from neighborhood PTAs), writes news briefs (often based on information from County government listservs), and coordinates with advertisers. The current editor coordinates newsletter distribution, but another volunteer could be recruited to do that. The prerequisites are a computer, Internet connection, and written communication skills.

The layout and design volunteer places the articles and advertisements into the newsletter template in Adobe InDesign. He/she occasionally creates small graphics or basic advertisements. AFCA reimburses for the InDesign subscription. The prerequisites are a computer, Internet connection, and InDesign proficiency.

Because the newsletter is published eight times a year on a fixed schedule, the editor and layout/design volunteer must be available on the eight weekends when final layout occurs. One person could do both jobs if they had both writing and InDesign skills.

What will life be like in Arlington Forest in 2030?

Whether you moved to Arlington Forest in the last century or in the last month, your experience here owes in part to the collective goals our neighborhood articulated in 1991, the year we completed our first Neighborhood Conservation Plan (NCP). Thirty years later, our goals remain similar, but our environment has changed. What are our collective hopes and concerns for the coming decade, and how can we best determine what they are? That is the topic of the October 16th AFCA meeting.

Many thanks to those who contributed to our street, drainage, and sidewalk inventory and our SWOC (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and challenges) analysis. Input indicates that many care deeply about protecting our urban forest, addressing erosion and stream degradation, improving pedestrian and cyclist safety, increasing socioeconomic diversity, maintaining Lubber Run Park and our amphitheater, and pressing the County to increase green space and expand parks as Arlington's population and recreational needs grow.

Our next step is among the most critical: to develop a neighborhood-wide survey. The survey seeks to identify what is good or special about our neighborhood and what is truly important to its residents. Without a sufficient survey participation rate, our Plan will not represent our collective goals (and will be rejected by the County). At the October 16th AFCA meeting, we will ask you to participate in developing the survey. We will provide guidelines and bring samples from neighborhoods. Hutch Brown, NCP editor, and Liz Kauffman, Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee (NCAC) representative for Arlington Forest, will collect your ideas on these topics: Neighborhood Goals, Land Use and Zoning, Street Conditions, Transportation/Traffic Management, Housing, Public Facilities and Services, Commercial/Business Areas, and Historic Preservation.

Bring your ideas and be part of the NCP update team. If you can't make it on the 16th, send your thoughts to lizkauffman@yahoo.com by October 30th.

WERA is a refreshing change from the blandness and predictability of commercial radio.



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What does as "AS-IS" sale mean to a buyer? On a typical sale, the seller is willing to negotiate reasonable repairs that come up in a home inspection or offer a credit to the buyer. With an AS-IS sale, the seller's position is they're not going to make any repairs to the home or offer any credits. In an AS-IS sale there's a contingency in the contract that allows a buyer to have the home inspection for "informational purposes only" with the right to void, which is always suggested so that you have an out. What you don't want to do is agree to buy the property in "as is" condition without having inspection only to learn that there's a structural problem or other major issue and you are stuck with more expense. In the competitive multiple offer environment in our current and recent local market, some buyers will waive all contingencies (home inspection, appraisal and financing) to gain consideration with a seller. In Arlington and other "hot" areas, this is commonplace.

One popular option is the pre-offer home inspection, where the buyer gets to inspect the home before they write the contract. Some sellers agree to this concept, while others might not. While we always recommend that a buyer obtain an inspection, there are situations where a buyer really wants the property and is willing to waive the inspection. A good agent knows that there are some other things that vou can do in order to get out. You might disclose the problems that were found to the lender, disclosing there is a serious issue. This might allow you to void the contract via the appraisal contingency, unless that has been waived as well, then you are stuck. Another exit is if the home is in an HOA or Condo. If you learn of a serious problem and haven't received the resale disclosure documents, you have the right to void. Unfortunately, in a typical community with older homes without an HOA, you are stuck. Let's talk about strategies if you are making a move in the near future!

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Fussy Cleaning for Nice People! by Joel S. Yudken

The Arlington Forest Shopping Center, built 1941-1947, is one of the oldest shopping centers in Arlington County. The dry cleaners serving the Arlington Forest community, now called New Forest Valet, has been at the same spot since the center opened. In 1967, the current business was purchased and opened by Arlington Forest resident Edgar McIntosh, Jr. with co-funding from his father. It has remained owned and operated by the McIntosh family for over the past 50 years.

Chris MacIntosh, who grew up in Arlington Forest, started working at the cleaners in the late 1970s, and took over running the family business with his wife Violet in 1990. Chris and Violet are both graduates of Marymount University, and have two children, now attending Bishop O'Connell High School, and a dog, Snoopy. His mother Pam, semi-retired, works at the cleaners part-time and still lives in the local area.

The cleaners is focused on providing quality and handson service to his customers. Friendliness and approachability are hallmarks of the business, as anybody who has brought in items to be cleaned can attest. Not surprisingly, the New Forest Valet has consistently received high marks for quality in consumer ratings such as Washington Consumers' Checkbook and online rating sites such as Yelp and Facebook.

In addition to standard dry cleaning services, New Forest Valet specializes in cleaning and restoring delicate or fancy items such as wedding gowns, table linens, drapers, leather, suede and furs. They also clean oversize items such as comforters and do tailoring, alterations and shop repairs. Aside from serving a large share of Arlington Forest homes, the business has long served institutional clients including Fort Meyer (cleaning alter linens and flags for deceased veteran services) and W-L High School (cleaning its band uniforms for over 30 years). Most work is done onsite.

Chris notes that his business, and the dry cleaning industry overall, has been a little down recently, partly due to weather events, the government shutdown last year, and more generally, as more people have been working at home, not needing their business attire to be cleaned as much. Nevertheless, New Forest Valet remains a vital and high-quality business serving Arlington Forest that deserves our support.


